# **Videologging of River Complete**

Some people float the river, some fish it, others may even roll on it, but for two days in December Ed Warfel and Jerry Erhart videologged it. Warfel and Erhart are pilots with Rettew Associates' airborne division. Using a helicopter (equipped with a Lycoming engine) the duo flew from Sunbury to Farrandsville. The helicopter had a video camera attached to the bottom to record the river. The camera and a Global Positioning System were linked together so each frame of video could be labeled with its location.

This information is back at Rettew being "processed." After processing the video will be linked with a Geographic Information System (GIS). The video and its link to GIS will assist the biologists, landscape architects, engineers, and planners who are writing the

# NPC Board Member Fondly Remembered

William F. Williams, Jr. was a NPC board member for nearly three years when he passed away on December 16, 2001. Bill lived in Antes Fort on his family farm. Bill volunteered many hours and served on many boards over the course of his life. He worked to improve and maintain this area and its resources. Bill served as Vice President and Secretary of the Jersey Shore State Bank, as well as serving on their Board of Directors. Bill's commitment to this area included 37 years on the Board of Trustees of Lock Haven University and 22 years as a school director for Jersey Shore.

Somehow, even doing all of this, Bill still managed to work in 200 rounds of golf in the year 2000. He often told us not to bother calling him until the late afternoon because he would be at the golf course in the morning.

Bill served NPC by sitting on several ad hoc committees, always brought his ideas and willingness to help to the Board meetings, and never left his sense of humor at the door. Bill and all of his experience will be missed by NPC.

# River Conservation Plan Moving Toward Second Round

Everything is on track for the Lower West Branch Susquehanna River Conservation Plan's second round of public meetings to be held during the last two weeks in March. The consultants and steering committee are busy preparing and editing the mapping, the plan, and the proposed projects list.

The meetings will be held in six locations along the seventy-five mile study corridor. As much as possible, NPC is working to hold the meetings in the same locations as the first round meetings held in March 2001. The meetings will begin at 7:00pm and run until approximately 9:00pm. Lower West Branch Susquehanna River Conservation Plan. This video will provide them with not only a new perspective of the river, but also allow them to see the river as users do. They won't be looking at a series of still photographs, but at a flowing resource.

It is hoped that the results of these flights will be unveiled at the second round of public meetings (see article on River Conservation Plan for dates and information). The videologging will also be provided to the schools, colleges, and municipalities in the corridor who are interested in using the data.

If you are interested in seeing the videologging results, be sure to attend one of the March River Conservation Plan public meetings, the Clinton County Dinner, or the Annual Dinner. Watch for more information in the Spring newsletter and on our website.

This project was funded through the Department of Environmental Protection's Growing Greener grant program. The educational grant was awarded to NPC in the Fall of 2001.◆

by the end of January.

•In addition, the Lower West Branch Susquehanna River Conservation Plan made huge strides. In March six public meetings were held. Over the summer



and fall thirty interviews were conducted, the videologging took place in December, and steps were taken to prepare for 2002's river conservation plan activities.

•We met with several individuals regarding conservation easements. However, this is a big step, and often, property owners wish to discuss this step with their children and family before committing. This is completely understandable, and if these owners decide to move forward, NPC will be here in 2002 to help them.

•We worked with the Bureau of Forestry to buy a property in the Black Forest area of Lycoming County. At the auction, the property was sold for more than we could pay.

•A property owner who wanted to give us a property worked with us for several weeks before deciding that since the property adjoined the Bureau of Forestry, they should own it.

Our land protection numbers may not have increased drastically, as the Smithgall and Ging property was the only property we bought, and no conservation easements were donated to us, but hopefully we have laid the groundwork for more projects on 2002.

Yes, 2001 was a busy year for NPC, but 2002 promises to be even busier! ◆
